

G.H.S. Expands Facilities by Lisa Stout, President

I am pleased to report that we have signed all the papers to purchase the building at 101 E. Main. This building will provide us with a lot of possibilities and opportunities: additional storage space (we can get the display case out of the bathroom), a meeting room area, an area for future exhibit preparation and a lot more.

We are applying for a grant to restore the outside facade to its original look as the State Bank of Greentown. Because this is a matching grant, we will have to match each dollar that we receive. You will probably have noticed that the aluminum awnings and the fabric awnings have been removed, thanks to Dwight Schaaf and Dwayne Schaaf. This is the start of the restoration.

There are many projects that need to be done in order to get the building ready for public use. The bathrooms need to be remodeled; fixtures and floor tiles have been donated by Barbara Middleton. Some of the carpet will have to be removed and new floors installed. Painting will be done, and some cracks and chips in the walls need to be repaired. Vertical blinds for the front windows will help save on the fuel bills, and they are ordered.

I am really excited about acquiring this building and hope that with your help and support we can continue to grow and be an asset to the community.

Great Finds in Small Items

Several months ago a friend, Craig Trott, was going through some boxes of things left to him by his grandfather, E. E. Trott, who used to own a grocery store in Greentown.

He came across a tally book for my grandfather, Virgil Turner, from November 28, 1940, to December 28, 1940.

Back then it was a common practice to charge your purchases and pay as you could each month. This small book was a fascinating look into the lives of my grandparents and their children, my mother Kathleen and her sister Mary, during that time.

The month of November ended with a balance of \$22.33. Grandpa paid \$15.00 toward his bill leaving a balance of \$7.33 and then charged his groceries for that day. His purchases included:

Corn Meal	.10
M Ham	.10
Bananas	.05
F. N. Soap	.05
Jewell	.19
Flour	.20
Sugar	.27

Lima Beans .15

Tobacco .25

The purchases for the rest of the month were recorded on the pages of that little book, and my grandmother's cooking habits were revealed. They ate lots of lima beans and cornbread. Bananas were purchased regularly as were coffee, eggs and apples.

Trips to the grocery were made almost every day. This led me to realize that they did not have the storage capacity or ability to keep things fresh that we have today.

One of the most memorable items that I found was the purchase of \$0.35 worth of candy that was made on December 24, 1940. I asked my mother about this, and she remembers getting a stocking with candy in it for Christmas that year. It was a real treat and the only Christmas present that she and her sister received. She was twelve that year and my aunt was nine.

I will be forever grateful to my friend Craig for giving me this glimpse into the lives of my grandparents and their children.
