# The History of Native American Indians in Indiana by Lisa Stout

The newest exhibit at the History Center opened on March 7 and will continue until June 28. With the help of the Miami Nation of Indians of Indiana, we have been able to borrow several panels that were made for the Eiteljorg Museum in Indianapolis; after that exhibit closed they donated the panels to the Miami Indian headquarters in Peru.

Minnetrista of Muncie has loaned us Grandfather Misomish to look over the exhibit seated in front of his wigwam. He has also collected various food items that would have been plentiful when the Miami lived in this area. Visitors will learn many facts about the Indians of eastern Indiana. Learn the difference between a wigwam and a tepee. Find out

how the Indians used the cattail plant for various other uses in their homes.
Learn the story of the Twigh Twee and the legend of the crane. Listen to the Twigh Twee Singers and imagine dancing to the drums.

See the many different collections of arrowheads found in the Howard County area. It has really opened my eyes to the vast amount of arrowheads found in this area. Farmers have spoken about being able to see the arrowhead from their tractors as they are plowing the fields. One good example of this was Bob Kurtz.

We have received furs from Maine and they are available for anyone to touch and identify. You can feel a buffalo hide and imagine using a blanket made from the hide.

# Liberty Twp. Records

This article continues the summary and interpretation of the handwritten records of the Board of Trustees of Liberty Township, Howard County, dating from 1853 through 1922. donated by Julia DeWitt in memory of Bernard DeWitt, Superintendent of Eastern Schools. This valuable record has added much more to our knowledge of early family names and property owners in our geographical area. As I mentioned in the first installment. I have transcribed names exactly as they appear in the record book in spite of the clerk's spelling of names.

The minutes of the Liberty

Township Board of Trustees continues with the first meeting of 1855 held on Feb. 24. Members present were L.F. Springer, President, T.W. Sanders, A. Cook, and L.S. Gray, Clerk. In April Charles Willits presented his credentials as an elected member of the board of trustees.

Like many others, this meeting approved the payment of road supervisors: Jefferson Segrave, road district 5, \$6.00; Milton Garrigus, road district 8, \$8.00; Daniel Barrett, road district 7, \$12.00; Francis Stanbrough, road district 6, \$4,00: Tense Howell, road district 4, \$4.00; David Smith, road district 2. \$4.00: David Larison, road district 1. \$6.00. The board received a detailed report of their funds on hand and expenditures. They began the year with \$1.16 on hand, \$36.50 for road funds, and \$15.37 from 3 road districts, making a balance of \$53.03 to begin 1855.

At the Feb.28 meeting among the various payments to officers and workers appear two payments showing increased board activity in the establishment of township schools. Rossetter Gray was paid \$5.00 for making deeds to lots for school houses. A. Cook was paid \$4.00 for township trustee affairs and \$2.00 for school affairs. T.W. Sanders was paid \$4.50 for township trustee affairs and \$1.50 for school affairs. L.S. Gray was paid \$2.00 as the clerk in school affairs and \$4.00 in township trustee affairs. The minutes show that landowners were assessed 8

cents on each \$100 for real and personal property for township purposes and 12 cents for road purposes; later in the same year the assessment was amended to include a fee of "25 cents assessed on each \$150 on each poll for the erection of school houses."

Throughout 1855 and 1856 road building continued to occupy the greatest amount of time and expense for the trustees. The following township road locations were investigated and approved: (1) a petition presented by T.L. Garrigus and others unnamed for "a township road 20 feet wide, following a line dividing the lands of Benjamin Woods and Robert D. Bowman until it intersects the county road leading from Greentown to Jerome"; (2) a road running east through the land of Tense Lindley: (3) a petition to change a township road "leading from William Davis' to Strawtown Road": (4) a change in a township road beginning at Kokomo-Jonesborough State Road, presented by W.C. Martin and others unnamed; (5) vacated a motion to build a road west on Jonathan Fisher's land, running south to intersect the road leading from Kokomo to Greentown.

The list of hands liable to work was submitted at the April 20 and 24 meetings to the clerk who recorded them in the trustees' record book. The reader will notice that a few names appear on more than one district list of names: (continued on page 7)

At the July 2, 1855, meeting I found the first mention of a Liberty Township library in the trustee records donated to the Historical Society. The board ordered an amount to the town librarian [no name given at that meeting to purchase "a book case suitable for the care and preservation of the books at the expense of the township." In addition, the board set the library's open hours to be on Saturday afternoon. In the April 26, 1856, meeting I found mentioned that S.G. Hall [also Supervisor of Road District No. 51 was appointed as Liberty Twp. Librarian. The limitation on use of books was increased from 30 days to 60 days. The overdue library book fine was set at 1 cent per day, and "the penalty be expugned [expunged]." At an earlier board meeting the minutes record that William Cox was assessed 60 cents damages for the destruction of a book: one is left to wonder about the circumstances of that damaged book; William was listed as a hand on the team of road district no. 8. As the year progressed, more actions were taken by the board relating to school building and governance. At the April 26, 1856, meeting the board paid out more in school expenses than recorded before in this record.
