Photo Archive Project Moving Forward Thanks to Grants

The Greentown Historical Society has received two grants which will enable the scanning and preserving of negatives and photographs. A Heritage Support Grant in the amount of \$7,861 was awarded by the Indiana Historical Society. A grant of \$1,372 was received from the Community Foundation of Howard County from the Credit Bureau of Kokomo Fund. The society will purchase scanning equipment and preservation materials.

Professional training in proper cataloging and cleaning of negatives, as well as scanning procedures, will be provided for a core group of volunteers. The impetus for this project is the donation of negatives from the fifty-year life of a local business, Jenkins Studio. Fred and Rachel Jenkins photographed people, events, and structures from 1962 to 2012.

Digital Preservation

Board members, Rachel Jenkins and Katie Regan, attended a workshop on Digital Preservation on March 16, 2016. The workshop was held in Crawfordsville and conducted by representatives of Indiana State University and Indiana State Library. The point was made that digital media does not have the same lifespan as print media and is far more fragile. Therefore, strategies and actions need to be put into policies to ensure access to content. A workbook was provided to inform present and future staff.

Fundraising


